



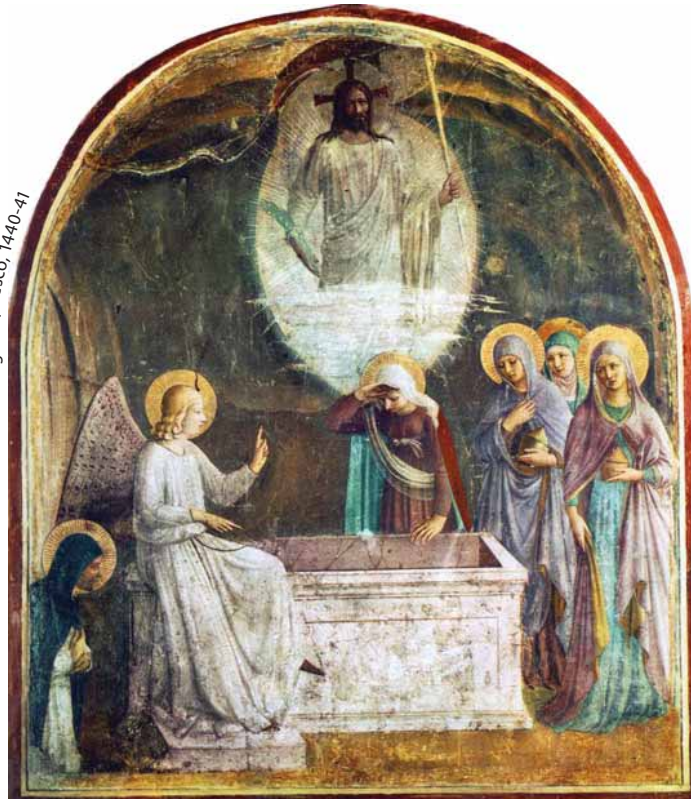

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Worldwide DISSEMI- NATION

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Outgoing Dissemination Chair



FOUR YEARS AGO IUA Executive Administrator Cathy Jones asked me to join the newly forming International Service Board as chair of the Outreach Committee. I gladly accepted. The Dissemination Committee did not exist then. As IUA was being launched the Charter and Bylaws were receiving last minute adjustments. Suddenly the Outreach Committee became the Dissemination Committee in a final flurry of organization. And soon thereafter IUA became UAI.

FOUR YEARS LATER, TIDINGS editor Cathy Jones asked the outgoing chairs to write a piece on, "just what you do in your job". Because of the pivotal role dissemination plays in fulfilling UAI's mission, a comprehensive answer to her question seems appropriate. One that addresses the genesis, evolution, status and plans for this unique central function of UAI.

After joining as outreach chair, I was more than a bit taken aback by the change to dissemination. There's quite a difference between the two! Outreach would be easy and interesting enough—personal contact with potential and new members everywhere. But dissemination is an entirely different and wider arena of service than outreach. One that will need long term planning, require centuries to achieve, and eventually involve millions not yet born.

The authors declare that a thing cannot be fully understood unless a thorough study is made of its origin, history and destiny. Therefore did it seem best to study everything available on dissemination, tapping the wisdom and experience of old and new readers from all quarters. And to look to our Charter's opening statement which says simply that our mission is to foster study and disseminate the teachings.

Some of the obvious first questions for the DC chair to answer were: Which teachings should the Dissemination Committee dis-

seminate? To whom? In what way? And how does the work of UAI's Education and Study Group Committees impinge on and relate to the DC's? Studying, discussions with a wide spectrum of members and officers, and winnowing of ideas went on for two years as one dissemination strategy after another was either adopted or discarded.

The word DISSEMINATION is of Latin origin, from the root verb: *to sow*. In general, it means *to scatter seed broadly*. Therefore did it seem altogether proper that the DC's metaphor for service should be spreading seeds. But seed what? Only books? Only the teachings? Both?

The revelation has at least two components to disseminate, the inviolate text and the 'benign virus'. The virus is born of the embrace and integration of the teachings founded on genuine spiritual experience. Any reader may spread the virus through living the teachings, with or without the text, "as they pass by". But why not do both when and where appropriate? Every situation calls for the spreading of the virus of brotherly love, but some also call for an introduction to a relevant concept or two from the revelation,

or perhaps even the book itself. If discretion is the better part of dissemination, then wisdom must play a leading role in spreading the teachings and the text. Over the last four years this central lesson on dissemination surfaced over and over in interactions and experiments with readers around the globe.

If a reader introduces the concept "friendship with God" into the cultural stream, for example in a Sunday school class, or in a local newspaper's editorial page, that reader is disseminating the teachings, preparing the soil for seeds of revelation. When a reader creates a quality secondary work with ideas and ideals from the Papers, puts it in his or her own words, that is disseminating the teachings. Some readers will leave a copy of the UAI Journal in a waiting room to pique interest, and some will post brochures on a bulletin board. Others will leave a book in a traveler's chapel. Dissemination of the teachings can be done in an infinite variety of ways, limited only by wisdom and creativity. Jesus was the ultimate disseminator. A study of his methods for spreading the teachings is essential for disseminators of all times. For reflections

on Jesus' approach to dissemination please see the 2006 February and May issues of the [UAI JOURNAL](#) in an article titled: *Dissemination: An Overview and A Plan*.

Another obvious and significant part of the DC chair's job is to distill the DC Bylaw mandates into cohesive dissemination strategies and activities that will resonate with member's real dissemination needs. And to determine how best to serve emerging sowers wanting to seed Urantia's many open fields. At the same time to coordinate DC programs and projects with the strategies and activities of the ISB's other committees. Much of the DC chair's work is balancing these many expectations from members and the Board, alongside the requirements of the founding documents. The DC chair must also yield and adapt to wisdom wrought by experience in the field,

and to convey relevant lessons to members offering similar dissemination services around the globe.

UAI Charter and Bylaws guidelines for the DC grew out of the manifold experience of the first reader groups dating back to the Forum. The first generation of readers started dissemination on the right foot apparently, and the second has continued this success, even amid many readership crises. The revelation is now in a dozen major languages and steadily approaching one million copies printed. Ten more translations are on the horizon. The history of dissemination of the text, albeit short, is a fascinating study by itself. The combined dissemination experience of the Foundation and the readership over fifty years was condensed into the DC's Bylaws.

The UAI Charter, Bylaws and central administration were designed to ensure the focus remains on fostering study and dissemination of the teachings. The printing and publication of the text for the book markets of the world is the work of Urantia Foundation. But effective dissemination requires that readers everywhere help in seeding and study. UAI has a real and important role in dissemination. And the Foundation cannot and should not have to do it alone. Each translation has to be spread just as the original English was: primarily person to person, one on one with seeding in libraries, universities, prisons, until enough demand builds for book sellers to stock it.

Much of the English speaking world has access to the revelation, North American and Australian libraries have been seeded, and other UK/Anglophone locales are quickly catching up. This leaves Central and South America, Africa, Asia, Europe (and someday Antarctica). These areas have had some tilling and sowing, but all need more. Some will require almost complete seeding (for example China, when that translation is printed at some point in the next decade). And they will need servicing for some time, until all translations are available and a readership developed with that essential core of sincere leaders and teachers required to work the local field. Because of the Internet effect, dissemination of the text may be almost entirely in electronic form in only a few years. No matter what form it takes, still will the inviolate revelation be needed as the source and standard by which all the others are measured.

Of course an area can't be seeded without a translation in the native tongue. The Chinese translation is forecast for completion soon. A recent survey found the number of religionists in China now exceeds 300 million. Surely this

is fertile ground for the revelation, but first a translation and an opening of that field must occur. And in India more people speak English than do in the US, therefore did the Foundation establish a publishing house for the English version in Delhi. A developing network of seed planters is forming in that populous nation. Work continues on the Mandarin and the Hindi translations so that eventually another third of Urantia's population will have the access to the book in a language they know.

Translation support and seeding are crucial aspects of DC planning and service. Since there will be no study groups, conferences or reader activity in a given region until the revelation has been seeded in the native tongue, it was deemed essential that the DC support the creation and dissemination of new translations. If readers of fifty years ago had not done their job, North America would not have the book available in so many ways and forms today. Each translation will have to be seeded in order for there to be readers or demand for them at book vendors.

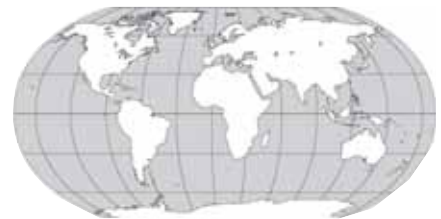
Several European language versions have come out recently, German, Italian, Portuguese and others. These fresh translations stand where the original version did fifty years ago. Seeding is the next step after a translation is printed. Study Groups, conferences, members and readers all have their genesis in seeding. Therefore seeding new translations is an integral part of the work of the DC. All UAI, and especially the DC should play a part in the birth, survival and success of each new version of the revelation.

The DC, in association with established member/readers, must till the soil and plant the seeds before new Associations can form to create local and regional dissemination activity. Once a translation has been produced, revelational cross fertilization will begin to produce the beneficent offshoots of study, service, and that most quintessential of all needs for successful organizations: a cohesive and responsive network of sincere, dedicated, wise and willing workers. Encouraging the formation of UAI Local Associations adds new strengths and possibilities to our organization.

During the ISB's first meetings in 2003 we began to establish what responsibilities each committee would have. It was decided the newly designated Dissemination Committee would handle "Referrals" (emerging readers seeking contact), mainly because that's what the old Outreach Committee did. Looking back I think it would have been better to give this responsibility to the Membership Committee, but the right time

to make this move has not occurred. It may happen yet. In any case, it was obvious that proper handling of Referrals is essential to UAI's growth and success. Referrals are to UAI what oxygen is to the human body. We will always require new members. Therefore a DC Referrals subcommittee had to be set up to communicate with the member contact network worldwide.

A loose-knit Referrals network existed already, but we needed to consolidate and reorganize the global network that meets and greets new comers. And we needed a document to establish the procedure for those working inside UAI at every level handling private names and addresses. Therefore did the Foundation and the DC Referrals subcommittee create a "Letter of Trust", which accompanies all Referrals and charges those who handle them, to treat them with the greatest care and respect. This subcommittee went through its trials, but now works fairly smoothly on a global basis. It can be made more effective by greater participation at the grassroots level. Everyone reaching out for contact wants to hear from readers in their area, for study, service and conferencing. If every Local and National Association has a membership officer whose responsibility this is, UAI will always have the welcome mat out. Membership officers contact new Referrals, but they also provide a crucial service in keeping UAI's database up to date. This info is vital for mailings and locating service-minded members of every talent and ability. (Where there are no Nationals or Locals, the ISB's Membership Committee makes contact with new Referrals.) It is interesting to observe that most Referrals come from North America and the UK, but now they are originating also from such



places as **SWEDEN, NIGERIA, ECUADOR, BULGARIA, SWITZERLAND, HUNGARY, ALGERIA, SAUDI ARABIA, MALAWI, PAKISTAN, INDONESIA, ITALY, LEBANON, THE PHILIPPINES, SOUTH AFRICA, TAIWAN, PERU, LITHUANIA, ETHIOPIA, RWANDA, GHANA, CHILE, SPAIN, HAITI, ICELAND, INDONESIA, GERMANY, VENEZUELA, NEW ZEALAND, PANAMA, COSTA RICA, AND YET OTHERS.** The revelation is spreading.

After establishing the Referrals subcommittee, and after considering about a dozen ideas and previously employed methods

of dissemination, it was decided that DC activities and projects will begin with the tried and proven projects: library placement, bookfair presentations, supporting and seeding new translations.

It was self evident one primary responsibility of the DC chair was to assess the state of library placement around the planet. The records show the US and Canada had been fairly well seeded by the first generation of readers, that these areas have the book or have access to a book via the ubiquitous library inter-loan system. The rest of the planet was and still is in a state of partial and patchy seeding. Estimates run between one and twenty percent of seeding is complete. Contemplating how to seed the whole planet in organized fashion gave birth to the **Global Seeding Project**, more on that below.

As regards long term dissemination, it is well worth mentioning that interest in paper and ink books is dropping. Indeed the print industry worldwide is undergoing a slow downward spiraling transformation. Paper and ink books are still a viable commodity, but people more and more are going to the internet for reading. There they can download the text into personal reading machines, even listen to it on audio, without having to buy it. That said, it seems an appropriate responsibility of the DC to continue to support and supply books to indigent readers who wish to do library placement, most especially in universities and seminaries. But very soon, the personal electronic library will replace the community brick and mortar library and our text dissemination strategies will have to adapt. The DC and the membership must ever be amenable to shifting circumstances, and library placement will need to evolve under increasingly fluctuating conditions, and as the stream of revelation becomes a river.

In the developing world, where the internet's reach is limited, books and libraries are still the most used instruments of instruction and learning. It is worth noting here that a 2000 book seeding tour of Africa's libraries and universities began last month (English and French), which will be followed by a 1000 book seeding (of the Portuguese) in Brazil. This is being done by one intrepid member and his backer, seeding all Foundation Books. Seeding is also taking place in the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Colombia, Venezuela, Pakistan, Indonesia,

Nigeria, Malawi, Zambia and other nations where readers need assistance realizing their worthy dissemination ideas.

The DC also created a Book Fair project in response to one of its Bylaw mandates. This UAI project is offered in conjunction with Urantia Foundation's Reader Services. It encourages members to give booth presentations in appropriate venues, for example librarian's conventions and book Expos. It offers a booth kit with Foundation translations and other materials for display. And it offers a network of experienced

presenters to tutor and encourage this form of dissemination aimed directly at book purveyors. Bookfairs have the additional advantage of teaching the presenter how, and how not to, relate the teachings in a one-to-one, low profile, public setting.

The day to day work of the DC chair is connecting people and resources for dissemination of the text and the teachings. And the Local member is crucial in this because she or he must be in place to adapt their chosen dissemination techniques to local conditions. It requires sincere, well established and wise leader/readers to assess service needs and activate a suitable plan in each area. The DC can and has acted as a facilitator and assistant to those working in the many outposts of the revelation on Urantia. And it is a nexus to the rest of the organization's manifold world-wide activities. In many ways the DC is like a tool chest for members. Members provide service, and the DC offers experience, methods, tutoring, and materials for those seeking them.

Last year the DC began an experimental program called the **Global Seeding Project** (GSP). It is designed to place the text in the hands of wise and willing disseminators around the world in spite of poverty or a lack of local availability. All Local and National Associations are invited to participate in the GSP. The GSP seeks out sincere and dedicated seed planters to sow new translations into the soil of the culture they serve. Already cases of ten seedbooks are slated to go to several

remote and/or impoverished regions, there to be planted by local member contacts. This project is intended to create a global network of local members who can represent the revelation in a one-to-one setting, and it offers them the training and tools they need to do it. The GSP has its own restricted fund for members wanting only to lend financial support.

The GSP has its origin in the prison placement project. The Prison Inquiry Response Team (PIRT) is a DC subcommittee of five core members. It was formed two years ago at Urantia Foundation's request. The Foundation provides unsaleable (slightly defective or damaged) books for this project. UF sends all its inmate inquiries to PIRT for contact and screening. The PIRT sends inmates several brochures, along with a cover letter explaining the terms for obtaining a book, then forwards a shipping request to UF Reader Services for those who respond and are approved.

To be accepted, prisons require that books be shipped from the publisher, and only the publisher. UF does this willingly but requests a shipping fee of \$8.00 from the inmate. If an inmate cannot pay shipping, the PIRT member decides whether to grant a waiver. The PIRT restricted fund is set up to cover this need; it ensures every sincere request is met. PIRT placed 335 copies (English and Spanish) in US inmate hands during '05 and '06. It is noteworthy that inmate Study Groups have recently begun to form in several US prisons. The DC chair's job is to oversee, coordinate and keep funded this project, and the GSP. So far the PIRT has served only US inmates, but the prison placement project is now available for other Nationals wanting to seed their prison libraries.

The DC chair's job is not of a single dimension. The chair also has the same responsibilities as every other committee chair to participate in Board decisions that range from our legal status to what our interdependent relation with the Foundation is to be. And there is budgeting and human resource management to do at an ever escalating pace. In 2007 the DC asked for \$2000, but much more could be spent on worthwhile projects. The dissemination needs will grow as the revelation continues its expansion.

It is challenging and simultaneously rewarding to be directly involved at the various levels and through many activities of our organization. How fortunate are we all to have a role in this beautiful unfolding of goodness and truth. I leave this office thanking UAI siblings for the chance to serve and can recommend to anyone serving on the ISB.

My term as chairman of the DC is over as soon as the Representative Council confirms the new election slate. I have been asked by my presumed

ON MARCH 12, 2007, A GROUP OF URANTIA book readers from Hawaii, Chile, and Argentina gathered on the beautiful shore of Lake Nahuel Huapi at the Hosteria del Lago in San Carlos de Bariloche to have a Urantia Book readers retreat. Part of the retreat involved preparing and presenting an introductory meeting for the public interested in learning more about the book. Attending the retreat were a group of long time readers who acted as the leaders:

Carlos Rubinsky of Buenos Aires, Marian and Matthew Hughes of Hawaii, and Dr. Victor Villuendas and Dr. Martha Villuendas of Bariloche. These older readers were ably supported by Ximena Campbell and Alessandro Guanieri of Puerto Varas, Chile and Federico Folchi also of Buenos Aires.

The first day of the retreat was spent studying the Urantia papers. The talk was focused on the nature of leadership and teaching, and how it related to the task of disseminating *The Urantia Book*. Because of the small number of attendees, discussion threads could be maintained through delicious meals during



breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Using the ideas shared in the first few days, the group worked together to set a strategy for presenting the book to people curious about the book from the Bariloche community. Prior to the retreat, through many emails, Marian and Federico were able to make preliminary plans. Thanks to Federico's organizational skills an excellent meeting room was secured at the Hosteria. The room was large, comfortable and included refreshments.

VICTOR AND MARTHA >> were instrumental in getting the word out and the public meeting gathered together 25 interested participants. Carlos Rubinsky led the meeting that was conducted primarily in Spanish. As frequently happens, a lively discussion ensued concerning re-incarnation, the practicality of a "history" book, and the mystery of the book's origin among other questions posed by the assembly of introducees. Alessandro and Ximena contributed their experiences as new readers to help people at the meeting understand the impact the book had on their lives. As a result, Carlos sold all the books that he had brought with him on the 19 hour bus ride from Buenos Aires. After over two hours of stimulating give and take, the meeting was formally ended but some of the group lingered for

another ½ hour and then eventually strolled across the street to a local eatery at midnight to discuss the highlights of the meeting. Everyone shared what they thought went well in the meeting and what could be improved for future gatherings of this nature.

The following morning a Remembrance Supper was held with the core group of conference



leaders. For some, it was their first time to experience this intimate communion with the Master. Carlos and Federico then embarked for another long, marathon bus ride to Buenos Aires, and Matt, Marian, Alessandro and Ximena spent a few extra days enjoying the Patagonia Andes and discussing plans to hold a similar gathering open to the public in Puerto Varas, Chile.

The retreat was a wonderful learning experience and it was great to see the Argentinian-Chilean Urantia connection being strengthened. □
